Good News of the Kingdom (Luke 7)

- Jesus' encounter with a Roman centurion at Capernaum (7:1–10) - Jesus performs a miracle at a distance, and at the end of the story we find 'the slave well' (7:10)
- 2. raising of the widow's son at Nain (7:11–17)'man who had died' (7:12) thereupon 'sat up, and began to speak' (7:15).
- **3. next eighteen verses** are chiefly concerned with Jesus' teaching
- 4. Our Text (7:37-50)



2 Characters

Pharisee

- A member of an ancient Jewish sect, distinguished by strict observance of the traditional and written law
- Well respected in the society

- Simon's view of himself-confident of his standing before God because of his works
- Simon's view of Jesus teacher maybe prophet suspected Jesus was a fraud and certainly not worthy of honor

2 Characters

Sinful woman

- A Woman who lived a sinful life
- Perhaps a prostitute
- Which made her an outcast and was looked down upon in the society
- Woman's view of herself – broken in need of forgiveness and peace in her soul.
 She was willing to give everything for it.
- Woman's view of Jesus- merciful friend of sinners and true prophet of God


Luke 7:33-34



The word 'alabastron' encompasses both the type of material as well as the form of container. Alabaster containers were ideal receptacle for perfume probably entered Israel from Egypt was frequently made into handless perfume flasks with necks typically long and thin. Jews, like all the other civilized ancient peoples made much use of fragrant ointment, often rare and great price.

While Jesus was in Bethany in the home of Simon the Leper, a woman came to him with an alabaster jar of very expensive perfume, which she poured on his head as he was reclining at the table.

Matthew 26:6-7



"In the day of Jesus, when a young woman reached the age of availability for marriage, her family would purchase her an alabaster jar and fill it with precious ointment. The size of the jar and the value of the ointment would parallel her family's wealth. This alabaster jar would be part of her dowry. When the young man came to ask for her in marriage, she would respond by taking the alabaster jar and breaking it at his feet. The gesture of anointing his feet showed him honor." (p. 156)
